The Keighley Association of Engineers is pleased to announce its next event in the 2013 syllabus, a talk by Mr Brian Hartness on the mechanisation and cutting of industrial diamonds.

Brian Hartness is the son of the former general manager at Asquith Engineering in Halifax and comes highly recommended to the Association having provided similar talks to many different organisations.

Brian's story has interesting historical connotations, at the time of the Second World War it was recognised that a large quantity of industrial diamonds existed in Germany. The British Government were concerned that there would be a shortage of industrial diamonds available to British manufacturing industry and that the German war machine would have a significant manufacturing advantage if they were able to obtain the diamonds! A plan was hatched to get the diamonds out of Germany and into the UK and this being successful the next problem was how to work them. In a rather audacious move a Manager at Asquith Engineering, Halifax convinced those involved that bringing the diamonds to Asquith would be the solution and so a project began to develop the technology to cut and polish the diamonds in a mechanised way to both speed up the process and lower the skill level required.
